

Creation Season – Part 3.....Attraction and Calling

One of the critical things many of us still have to learn is that the earth is not a resource for humans! We are kidding ourselves if we cannot see that the planet's resources are finite. We need a new way of relating to earth and we need a new understanding of what it means to be human. Such an understanding must recognise that we are part of, not separate from, or superior to the earth community. At this time in our history, there is a strong call for this resonating around the globe.

It is helpful to understand the spiritual basis of this call, which can be described as an attraction or allurement. You may seen the recent ABC's series 'Adventures of Space and Time', presented by Brian Cox. One episode was devoted to the marvel of 'Gravity'. Some scientists suggest that gravity is the power of attraction that holds the universe together. We are made from stardust, so we are of the universe. We therefore share in this power of attraction, which we experience it every day, though of course we can become deadened in our awareness or response to it.

We know that the stars were drawn to form galaxies and that they have become part of the ongoing allurement, whereby galactic material is always being drawn together. The sun and the earth are in this same sort of relationship. We know now that the sun does not rise, but earth does! It is orbiting and rotating around the sun in a magic connection that is at the basis of attraction. It has been doing this for four and a half billion years. The earth, which came from 'spare bits' of the sun, remains in its orbit, always connected and constantly 'feeding' from it. The sun bathes the earth with light and the earth orients itself towards the sun. Without the sun, we have no life.



What a miracle the creation of the chlorophyll molecule (photosynthesis) was! Light energy is captured by molecules that absorb light (pigments) that include the green pigment chlorophyll, and transform carbon dioxide and water into carbohydrates and oxygen. In the photosynthetic reaction, electrons are transferred from water to carbon dioxide. Chlorophyll assists this to happen. The metallic atom at the centre of the pigment is magnesium. Chlorophyll absorbs strongly in the red and blue-violet regions of the visible spectrum, so the light it reflects and transmits appears green.

We take all this for granted, because we don't appreciate the complexity and wonder of it, and yet all our food depends on it. Brian Swimme has suggested that it's good to contemplate that photosynthesis was 'created' by an early life form that did not have a brain, eyes or hands!

Sexuality (two organisms joining and giving rise to offspring) developed around two billion years ago. Genitalia developed with the reptiles who 'gave birth' to the dinosaurs and birds and, in time, to humans. This sexuality continued through a long

process and lead to ongoing intimacy. The methods that led to arousal have been remembered by successive generations, and life responds to this deep powerful 'drag'. The universe houses sexual attraction within humans, only as the result of a process that has been going on for more than thirteen billion years. Allurement is in charge of us, not the other way around, and it is a privilege to be involved in it.

The same power that drew together the stars and galaxies is at work within us. We do not construct allurement or make it happen. It is seeking to burst into our self-reflecting consciousness. All we have to do is allow it to happen; to let it flood over us. So often a profound experience, such as scenic beauty or a magnificent sunset, overtakes our senses and the attraction we feel, connects us. It is not a sedate, measured response, it is wild energy, because that is the nature of life. Control or domestication is a veneer. It is not free and natural.

When we are attracted to someone or something, we have already been acted upon, and an element of 'adoration' that we feel, opens us and allows the very essence of who we are to be moulded by this attraction. We can be attracted to a sunset, an ocean, a river, a mountain, the stars, a farm, a bay, and animal or to other humans. The dynamic is similar to the way the earth is drawn to the sun. Earth reflects the very structure of the sun. Chlorophyll will not work on any other planet that we know of. It works on earth and with our sun.

Humans are tender, and as a result, their encounters can often be wounding. It is likely that what we are attracted to, has been wounded. This is especially true of other humans. When an organism is wounded, it closes down some of its membranes to protect itself, and it remains in a



reduced state of life. We have seen this happen in ourselves and others, but it also happens in other species, and even bio-regions experience this. The intensity of attraction can weaken these membranes and draw out what is at the depth, in this way identifying which wounds in fact participates in healing.

In humans, there is sometimes the profound experience of loving a person back to life, that begins with this profound attraction that reaches to the core of the other, and slowly brings out life.


Humans have an intense desire to commune with others, to be a presence of goodness and joy, and to evoke this from one another. Through the specific quality of self-reflection, humans learn how to experience what another person feels and we desire to feel his or her joy. Then a person wants not only to be a cause of joy for another person, but he or she wants to experience the effect of this joy which creates

a new depth. This is the true meaning of ecstasy. Self-reflection allows us to understand that we can be the cause of the joy that we know another person is experiencing.

Signs of people possessing this sense of attraction are easily recognisable. Such people display a passionate absorption with life. They display a wide spectrum of feelings and moods, because they have absorbed the moods of others. When fully alive, they have a capacity to be completely overwhelmed (lost) in situations that might seem trivial. They have a sensitivity to beauty in all its forms. They are open to the reality that life 'calls' them.

When we appreciate our place in the Universe story, we come to know that we draw on the past and that the future presses into the present. Universe time is not clock time. It a measure for knowing the moment for creativity, so it changes, depending on our creativity. The great moments in creation, such as the devel opment of the

hydrogen atom, the formation of the galaxies, photosynthesis, the birth of the sun, or life on earth, are what marks time. How, otherwise can we speak of a billion years? It has no meaning for us. Rather, we need to come to recognise the 'Kairos', the right time, and this is related to how we read the signs of the times.



If we are attuned and listening, these signs are easy for us to recognise, even if we don't know what they are calling us to. Throughout history great thinking and movements have emerged at parallel times. Think of the development of the great religions and civilizations, particular scientific insights including the almost exact timing for Alfred Wallace and Charles Darwin to 'discover' evolution. This is no coincidence. It is the result of active listening to the promptings of creativity despite the recipients being in separate locations. This experience tells us what time is. The universe's sense of time, is not linear. It is 'the time for' and Ecclesiastes suggests 'there is a time for everything'. We have to listen; we have to become aware of 'the (right) time'. To do this, we must appreciate that the way the divine, through the Universe, speaks to us, is to remove our former fascinations so that they no longer have the same attraction compared with something else that is stirring or calling. To be in tune with this, we need to listen to what attracts us, what repels us, what bores us. If it is boring us, it will de-energise us, and rob us of potential or of opportunities.

It is this experience that many people identify as 'knowing their vocation'. It is that moment when it becomes clear that there is a beckoning, or an illumination to follow a particular path. It can be ignored, but any alternate choice we make is taken knowingly. It can be the lure of a new adventure or new opportunity, not necessarily of our own making or choosing. It can seem like a prompting, or even sometimes more strongly, it can be a feeling of being dragged to follow. Perhaps this was Luther's experience when he said, "Here I stand, I can do no other". Knowing the almost incredible demands of achieving it, imagine the vision, the allurement, the knowing, that the Pharaoh Kofu had, to build the Great Pyramid.
