On Sunday May 6th, the PFGM celebrates 50 years since Passionist Family Groups began in St Anthony of the Field's parish, Terrey Hills. The Movement became one of the most significant ministries in which professed and lay Passionists shared significant leadership roles. The first 'Family Groups' were such a convincing model of community that despite being a small parish, 26 groups formed in Terrey Hills parish.

Groups included people of different ages, cultires and very often a spouse of different faith, who all found a very practical way of living the gospel – not through discussion but through practical care

and support of one another. Interestingly, many people in the groups became involved in parish Committees or groups and wanted more understanding of the new level of faith they were living.

The logo that developed captures what a PFG is. It is based on the Passionist sign, except that the cross on the sign is placed on top of the heart to demonstrate that this is the greatest sign we have of God's love. In the PFG logo the cross is Inside the heart along with is a 'cross'-section of people to demonstrate that we carry each other's crosses. The heart encloses the people, highlighting that the



Movement is about love. The motto 'A Family For All' says it all.



It helped to have a dynamic leader and Peter McGrath CP was such a person. Having discovered a way to help people get to know each other and extend fellowship to others, Peter built an incredibly strong sense of connection within the Terrey Hills parish, building on faith formation sessions that allowed people to see the practical way they could live gospel values by creating extended fellowship.

It was nine years before another parish asked and was helped to establish Family Groups in their parish. A trickle more parishes followed and from 1985 there was rapid expansion for a decade followed by continued expansion, involving tens of thousands of people. All of that required oversight and structure to ensure the aims

and goals were highlighted and that leadership of groups was seen as a genuine pastoral ministry.

Peter McGrath and his team began to cover many miles in the ensuing years. The photo here shows Peter at the front and behind him to the left his understated co-founder, Mary Ingham



By 1990 the first lay Directors of an area were appointed replacing professed men, and this trend continued until all regions were served by lay Passionists. It was a good model for church leadership. Tina Minchilli from Holy Cross is the current National Coordinator for Australia and Paul Traynor is is the National Coordinator for New Zealand.



We have not introduced Passionist Family Groups specifically at Holy Cross, because Templestowe parish has PFG's and quite a number of the Holy Cross community belong to the parish PFG's. Cathy Hardinge is the parish coordinator. There are also people who attend Holy Cross regularly, who belong to a PFG in another parish. Anyone is welcome to join. This was the invitation Jesus




