# delivery. Your generosity is greatly appreciated. **The struggle of so many peoples – Cuba! The Trauma of the Returnee (**Nuria Lopez Torres)

Cuba is in the middle of its largest exodus in sixty-five years amid a collapse in its



economy. In 2022, U.S. border authorities intercepted 313,499 Cubans by land and sea. Despite expanding humanitarian parole in 2023, the United States still cannot accommodate the high demand, and Cubans continue to look for new ways to leave their country and for other places to go.

While some Cubans succeed in beginning new lives elsewhere, others are forced to return—a process that is often psychologically, physically, and financially traumatic. The vast majority of Cubans sell their houses, cars, furniture, and appliances to raise enough money to emigrate. In the most extreme cases, returnees without money or prospects have taken their own lives. "In this country," explains one would-be migrant,



"there is no future for young people. Really, there is no future for anyone." In the absence of material opportunities, people in many Cuban communities rely on networks of family and friends to support one another. And many who failed to escape the country the first time they tried, are still hoping to try again.

Alexis and his family sold everything they owned to

buy the materials for the boat they tried to take to the United States. They were intercepted a few miles from shore and deported. Back in the fishing village of Jaimanitas, outside Havana, they can't work because they are deportees, and they can't start a private business because they have no money left. They live with the help of neighbours and relatives and without the ability to migrate again. Alexis Jr. attempted suicide; his daughter suffers from chronic nightmares about the police and the sea.

Kiriam saved enough money to ensure she did not have to sell the small apartment where she lived with her mother when she left Cuba. She hoped to move to Spain and then bring her mother to Europe. After paying €3,000 for the journey and for legal papers, she entered Europe via Russia, which does not require visas for Cuban citizens.



But instead of traveling to Barcelona, she was detained for two months in a Russian prison and then deported. She was isolated in a subfreezing cell: "I thought I was going crazy when, after a month, I started talking to myself out loud and answering my questions as if I were someone else." Thinking of the process makes her cry. "I was in Russia in a cell ten meters square, and now I'm in a cell the size of an island."

Many Cubans emigrate in hopes of providing financial support for family members who stay in Cuba. When Dayron went to Russia, he wanted to help his mother, who lived in a small, rural town without reliable electricity or water. In Russia, Cubans cannot gain status as permanent residents Dayron worked in terrible conditions and barely earned enough money to support himself.. After suffering through a year of loneliness and



economic insecurity, a physical assault, and an extended illness, he decided to return to Cuba. The shame of failing in his migration process weighs heavily on Dayron. He is trying to overcome the feeling of failure and earn some money as a cab driver with an old 1950s car.

#### **Province Formation news**



Fr Denis announced some news yesterday regarding student movement throughout the Province.

Our initial formation stages in Vietnam have been very lengthy, prior to novitiate. Applicants undertake a three or

four year university programme while either living-in or having regular contact, as an aspirant. They then undertake a general year of orientation with increased English studies. Next they move to our St Paul's community to undertake two years of philosophy (or three years if they study at the Jesuits).

At the completion of philosophy they transfer to Holy Cross in Melbourne to undertake a year of postulancy with a major focus on learning English at ELSPM, the language study centre established by the Passionists. Until COVID, the postulants then progressed to Adelaide to undertake novitiate. In recent years, the novitiate has taken place in Saigon. All this represented a minimum of eight years before taking vows.



The change that will come into effect, is that following university and the year of orientation, the men will progress to their postulancy year at St Gabriel's in Saigon, and then immediately to novitiate. This will mean that profession will normally occur two or three years earlier that has been usual. We anticipate a novitiate may occur every second year.

There will be six Vietnamese participants in the next novitiate class, including two men who were here last year (Thang and DJ) and the three current postulants, Hai, Thang and Cu'ong. The sixth member, Hậu is completing his third year of philosophy in Saigon. In a new initiative they will undertake their novitiate in the Philippines,



with five local novices, under the leadership of Fr Chris Aitakan CP who is well known to us in Australia. He served as novice director assistant to Bro Larry Finn. Chris will have Fr Willie Estrada as his assistant, who was novice master for the class that Erick was a part of in Adelaide in 2011. Bro Larry will also offer specialist assistance. The Vietnamese contingent will travel to southern Philippines on July 12th, with Fr Chris.

There are other ongoing matters that require adjustment including the new building to be completed mid-year on the St Gabriel's property and readjustment of formators for groups of students. This is 'happy' problem of having a large number of students.
