Vietnam

The Province Formation Commission met in St Paul's, Saigon last weekend



The photo above was taken on a typically smoggy morning from the balcony of St Paul's, where we did have a most enjoyable evening BBQ on a clear Sunday night with the city lights on full display.

The role of the Commission is to oversee and support the formation of all our candidates, professed members and Passionist laity.

The Passionists in Vietnam celebrate 20 years of presence this year and a great deal has been achieved in establishing communities (including the completion or ongoing completion of the necessary buildings) and attracting and guiding so many men through the formation process.

Eighteen Vietnamese men have been ordained priests. Phi will make that nineteen in two week's time, and Vinh (seen in the photo above) was ordained deacon last

year. Three students are finally professed. There are thirteen temporary professed students, six novices, four philosophy students and seven aspirants.

Among the many challenges is the reality that we do not have the senior men in Vietnam that we have in our other Province formation communities (here at Holy Cross, in Boroko, PNG and in the Philippine's novitiate. Those we have asked to serve as formators are themselves young in terms of religious life and this is both a difficult and unfair task for them, because they would ideally be involved now in external ministry and bring that experience to their role in a few years time. They need our encouragement and support.

The Commission has to be attentive to the structures that will support healthy formation, so that our candidates are sufficiently developed as human persons, steeped in our charism, committed to community life, adequately qualified in theology and capable of serving as ministers in a challenging era of the church and the world.

Each candidate needs and deserves personal assistance from his formator, who are accompaniers, and we expect each candidate to take responsibility for his own vocation. Most of them are more than 25 years of age and some are in their mid 30's. We expect them to recognise and contribute what is required to live in community, since this is a fundamental aspect of our charism. We are not seeking high-achievers. Rather we are seeking well-rounded individuals who live in unity with compassion, forgiveness , joy and the other gospel values.

When it's all over



One of the things we try to highlight about a formation community, is that candidates should get to see Passionist life in action from the men who have been living it for many years. This is particularly important in Vietnam, where clericalism is strong. This can give rise to a sense of privilege.

My father gave us much valuable advice in the form of popular sayings. One of them was "Talk's cheap". Whatever the ideals of community life, they have to be put into practice, and no tasks are beneath us. After the day was done last Sunday, this photo away from the departed crowd at 4.15pm, shows Chris working at dismantling

the St Gabriel marquees that survived the high winds...

Ash Wednesday



There will be Mass and blessing with the ashes in the Holy Cross chapel at 9.30am

Ashes are the remains of destruction by fire so they are a powerful symbol. Ashes are also a symbol of the seasonal regeneration that follows burning. After bushfires tree trunks remain black. However,

green gradually emerges from the ashes and sprout from blackened tree branches. In the forest, death yields to life. That is the whole point of Lent. Ashes do not have the last word. Life continues, regenerates, and spreads from the ashes. In the Christian story, the ash of sinful humanity reflects the love that leads God to share the ashes of our life, the humiliation of dying naked on a cross, and to rise green from the ashes. The ashes of Lent look forward to the green and spreading vine of Easter by which we are received into the joy of the kingdom of God.


Wayne & Shuster
