The two central aisles of the cathedral were packed, and the generous, devoted and dedicated service Noel offered as a medical doctor for almost fifty years was celebrated. Noel was 74. Another son, Paul, gave a humourous, and like Bernadette, honest and admiring testimony to his father who was multi-talented especially in music, a long time volunteer at Eastern Health palliative care and a deeply committed disciple of Jesus. Peter was aged 93.

Bondi



The tragedy of December 15th was a stark reminder of the challenges we face in promoting and living in peace, and the deeply unfair situation that Jewish people and so many others suffer from, being labelled and targeted by hatred. They are each individual people with hopes and dreams like

ours, but so often they are demonised and forced to live in fear.



Act 3 of 'William Shakespeare's play, 'The Merchant of Venice' reveals that an money lending agreement has been made between Antonio, a Christian merchant and Shylock, a Jewish money lender. The terms and conditions of the loan are simple: Antonio must repay his debt in full to Shylock within three months. If the debt is not repaid within that timeframe, Antonio must forfeit one pound of his own flesh to Shylock. Antonio and Shylock have known each other for a long time.

They had traded together but they despise one another. Shylock feels he has been discriminated against by Antonio and other Christians who display overt anti-Semitic views; when he is asked for money by Antonio he sees an opportunity to take revenge.



In his now famous speech in the play, Shylock explains the rationale behind the grotesque conditions of his contract with Antonio, arguing for his dignity against Semitic discrimination. Shylock challenged his Christian audience asking, are not all humans created equal?

"Like using fish as bait for fish, if it will feed nothing else, it will feed my revenge. He has disgraced me, and cost me a fortune, laughed at my losses, mocked at my gains, scorned my nation, thwarted my bargains, cooled my friends, heated mine enemies, and what's his reason? I am a Jew!

If you prick us, do we not bleed? if you tickle us, do we not laugh? if you poison us, do we not die? and if you wrong us, shall we not revenge?

- William Shakespeare

Has not a Jew eyes? Has not a Jew hands, organs, dimensions, senses, affections, passions? Fed with the same food, hurt with the same weapons, subject to the same diseases, healed by the same means, warmed and cooled by the same winter and summer, as a Christian is? If you prick us, do we not bleed? If you tickle us, do we not laugh? If you poison us, do we not die? And if you wrong us, shall we not revenge?

If we are like you in the rest, we will resemble you in that. If a Jew wrong a Christian, what is his humility? Revenge. If a Christian wrong a Jew, what should his sufferance be by Christian example? Why, revenge. The villainy you teach me, I will execute, and it shall go hard but I will better the instruction".

One way we can respond to the Bondi event is to determine personally to be mindful of generalisations that put people into boxes while not respecting either their dignity or their individuality. A way to peace is to reject personal bias and consider all peoples and every person to be a sister and brother. Jesus advised us: "I was hungry and you fed me; I was thirsty and you gave me a drink; I had insufficient clothes and you gave me garments;

For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink. I was a stranger and you invited me in. I needed clothes and you clothed me. I was ill and you looked after me.

Matthew 25.35-36



I was a stranger and you welcomed me; I was sick and you came to see me".

Advent - Love

During the Sundays of Advent we have focused on a theme for each week...Hope Peace and Joy. This coming Sunday we focus on **Love.**



Some years ago I played the song "Love Changes Everything" during a parish mission session. Afterwards a woman complained to me, "That song should not be used in church. It does not mention God even once". I replied, "St John's gospel tell us that Jesus said, "God is Love". After looking a bit stunned she walked away. In

the church we have so often complicated gospel love by putting the emphasis on rules, on do's and don'ts, wheras Jesus made it rather simple. "Love one another as I have loved you"!

Nowhere is love better described that in St Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Paul begins in Chapter 13 by saying, "If I can speak in tongues or use the language of angels, but if I don't have love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal" That lady who spoke to me after the missions session was a noisy gong. She missed the whole point — Love changes everything!



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In the section we know so well, St Paul says, "Love is patient and always takes the initiative; love is not envious, boastful, arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice in wrongdoing, but rejoices in the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends".

What is left to be said? There are no limits. Love never stops loving! Advent loves calls to this love. It reminds us that the Christmas God comes among us not as an overpowering and dominant warlord, but a human baby, just like any of us. This baby was vulnerable, needy and helpless. This baby was born in a cattle trough, not in a palace. This baby, God-among-us, Emmanuel grew into the man Jesus, whose love knew no limits; the man of compassion and forgiveness, thus assuring us of our own human capacity to love; to be like him.



Unfortunately the word 'love' is often misused, so that people will say 'I love ice cream' or I love that car'. This is 'object-centred'

love. People with low self esteem are often victims to this kind of love, and of course it is shallow because it

is not relationship focused but focused on what 'I' want or need.

Projective love is idealistic and romantic. It is blind to faults. One person may see another person in an ideal way, and project on to them all that they want that person to be. Many famous fables or fairy stories reflect this kind of love. Projective love is possessive and it excludes others. It holds back and is a 'closed' love, because it seeks exclusivity believing the other person can meet every need.



Because it is unrealistic, projective love eventually becomes disillusioned.




Unconditional love seeks to accept others 'as they are', even with their weaknesses. This kind of love is capable of sacrificing oneself for the other. It is the basis of the Christian message and it is symbolised in the cross. It is what allows a person to feel safe and secure because they know they are loved not just for

their externals (looks, gifts, possessions etc) which can change, but they are loved 'as they are' – for better or worse!

In the massacre at Port Arthur a man noticed Martin Bryant (the gunman) turn and point his gun at his wife lying on the floor. Instantly the man threw himself on top of his wife. He was shot dead. She survived. This is ultimate love. Unlike object-centred and projective love, this love focuses on the other person, not oneself. Only unconditional love allows the other person to grow. This love is more than a feeling. It is a decision and a commitment.

A man named Richard spent many years ministering to homeless men in inner-city Melbourne. One man he met grabbed his attention. Johnny was the quintessential hobo. He slept in bus shelters, carried his belongings in a shopping trolley, while



his body was covered in street grime. What stood out though amidst the misery and emptiness of Johnny's dog-eat-dog world was his deep sense of respect for others; his warm, peaceful countenance.

This inner beauty seemed so incongruous, so confounding, to Richard. His curiosity got the better of him and he posed a clumsy question: "Johnny, your life isn't exactly a bed of roses, yet you are you so content and so kind to others. How has that

happened?" After a quiet, thoughtful pause, Johnny said gently, "God is very fond of me!" This is the message Jesus preached and acted out – that God was very fond of Samaritans, lepers, tax-collectors, prostitutes, public sinners. If we loved as Jesus loved, there would be no hatred. Let us remember Jesus final prayer - "Father forgive them for they know not what they do!"

Every week Carmen Zammit washes and irons the altar linen. Shirley Barnes cooks twice a week for the community each week, and a few other people, including Teresa Lim, prepare, donate or cook for us on occasions. Teresa also arranges and looks after our altar cloths. We have missed her in recent weeks while she has been confined because if illness.

Our 'Come Away' team led by Sr Brigid CP includes Pam Storey, Kay Lewis, Lien Thai and Paolo Cheng, has continued to offer opportunities for spiritual enrichment. Our small group of Passionist Companions meets faithfully and reminds us how strong and alive the Passionist charism is among so many committed Passionists who are not professed.

The **St Gabriel's Association** are an active, visible and generous group, Their personal contribution, their genersoity and hard work has been invaluable to Holy Cross. **Bruno Petrocco** has been the key man over many years. Another **benefactor couple** have contributed to several projects over the years, including thepurpose and installation of air-condiitoners in the Retreat Centre rooms and the chapel. Other benefactors such as the **Mattioli family** have assisted us with some large painting tasks and regularly, members of our Holy Cross community make generous donations to us. A special mention is due to **Tina Minichillii** who is the Province Risk Managagement Officer. She works closely with **Graeme Newcombe**, our community Safeguarding Officer to identify, eliminate or reduce safety risks. Tina is constanty visiting and assiting people who are unwell and networking to create and sustain relaionships. She was the driving force behind the very successful fundraiser held in August.

THE TRAGEDY OF THE BONDI SHOOTINGS

Over the weekend Australians were subjected to violence and death along Bondi Beach, Sydney. Normally we simply identify ourselves as 'Australians' and in fact widely celebrate our multi-cultural diversity. We are unaccustomed to adding any culturally or religiously based adjectives to our essential identity. But the prejudice and terror unleashed on our fellow citizens merely because they live their Jewish faith with pride is horrific and deserving of our strongest condemnation.

We often preach of the little acts that gently build God's reign in our world. Sadly, in the violence at Bondi we see too that prejudice, ignorance and hate filled memories can also lead to acts which break down harmony and our sense of a common humanity.

We offer our support to the Jewish community at this time. Many of us have friends and associates who share their Jewish faith with pride. Their peace and sense of security will be threatened at what should be a time of happiness and festivities.

No doubt these murders will lead to further security processes and perhaps other changes in the way we live our freedom. Further gun control or gun ownership scrutiny may be a helpful action, but the deeper need is advocacy for tolerance.

As Passionists let our message - be it in preaching or lived example - be one of inclusion and acceptance.

Overseas violence resonates in every setting, our message must be one that builds harmony and tolerance in the face of destructive messaging and unreflective prejudices.

Father Giuseppe our Superior General has written to us today, I whole heartedly endorse his message and suggest it is shared in our parishes and on our social networks for all to see.

Dear Fr. Denis,

Greetings from Sts. John and Paul's, Rome.

On behalf of the General Council and in my own name, I wish to express our deep closeness and heartfelt support to you, to the confreres of the Holy Spirit Province, and to all the people entrusted to your pastoral care in Australia following the tragic shootings on Bondi Beach the other day.

We are profoundly grieved by this senseless act of violence and by the loss of innocent lives. Such events once again expose the painful reality of growing hatred, fear, and fragmentation among peoples—realities that strike at the very heart of our shared humanity and wound the hope of peaceful coexistence.

At moments like these, the Passionist vocation takes on renewed urgency. As sons of St. Paul of the Cross, called to keep alive the *Memoria Passionis*, we stand before the Cross of Christ where all violence is unmasked and all hatred is overcome by self-giving love. In the crucified and risen Lord, we recognize both the depth of human suffering and God's definitive response: reconciliation, mercy, and peace.

In this holy season of Advent, as the Church prepares to celebrate the birth of Jesus, the Prince of Peace, our sorrow is accompanied by a renewed call to conversion of hearts. Advent invites us not only to wait, but to witness—to become artisans of peace, preachers of harmony, and signs of hope in a world so often marked by division and fear. The peace that Christ establishes through his death and resurrection is not fragile or fleeting; it is a peace rooted in justice, compassion, and forgiveness.

Please be assured of our prayers for the victims and their families, for those traumatized by this great tragedy, and for the entire nation of Australia at this difficult time. We also pray for you and your confreres, that you may be strengthened in your mission to proclaim Christ crucified and risen, and to continue offering a prophetic witness of peace, reconciliation, and unity.

May the Lord who comes to dwell among us in humility and love sustain you with his consolation, and may Mary, Queen of Peace, keep you under her maternal protection.
