### Singalongs community and separation



Jesse Rifkin performs at piano bars in Washington and he wrote an interesting reflection on his experience published in 'The Age' on Tuesday. Often he invites the audience - 'everybody' join in and with iconic songs like Piano Man, We will Rock You, American Pie, Take Me Home Country Roads, Hey

Jude, Sweet Caroline etc there is a universal response. He has noted however than with many contemporary songs only half know the chorus and in some cases it is 'all the girls' or 'all the guys' who sing. Rifkin has noted that subgroups favour a song because of its message, and in some cases that message is not important or attractive to another group, so instead of everybody joining in, these songs can become divisive.

Rifkin's point is that by not singing communally we can lose the emotional experience of feeling bonded with those from different groups or ideologies. This can have damaging effects on our wider experience of genuine humanity. He refers to surveys in the last two decades that reveal Americans are increasingly unlikely to have cross-ideology friendships or to live near neighbours who disagree politically. Some refuse to join-in with those who think or act differently from them.



## Epiphany....4<sup>th</sup> January



The magi as they are called, were astrologists or nature worshippers. They are only mentioned in Matthew's gospel and he does not tell us they were kings; nor how many Magi there were. These 'wise men' came to Bethlehem and were able to find Jesus by following their astrologist tradition. They followed a star!

The fact that they found Jesus challenges us, because many people within the Christian tradition never really find Jesus....not the real Jesus who was friend of sinners and outcasts, full of forgiveness and compassion – welcoming of everybody; They don't find the Jesus who talked about the kingdom of God as being like a party that includes everybody, both friend and stranger. Although the image that Jesus used often – that life in his kingdom is like a big feast that everyone is invited to join, many Christians want to exclude those who sin seriously, from the feast so, like many religious leaders in Jesus' own time - they miss the point entirely.



In the Acts of the apostles, Luke records St Peter saying, "I have come to see that God has no favourites; anybody of any nationality who seeks God and does what is right, is acceptable (to God)" This was a wonderful insight for Peter. He came to realise that every person is special to God, not just the people of his own Jewish tradition. He came to the incredible recognition that God does not have favourites – everyone is God's favourite!

Some years ago a scientist named Loren Eiseley told a story about something



that changed his life. One night he was unable to sleep, so he got up early in the morning and went for a walk along the seashore. As he looked down the beach, he saw in the distance, a man throwing things into the ocean. As he got closer, he called out, "Good morning! What are you doing?" The man looked up and replied, "I am throwing starfish back into the ocean because the tide is going out, and if I don't throw them into the sea they will die.



Loren said “But there are many kilometres of beach and hundreds of starfish all along it. You won’t be able to make a difference!” The man listened quietly. Then he bent down, picked up another starfish and threw it into the sea, past the breaking waves, and then he said “I’ve made a difference for that one!” The scientist was shocked by this beautiful answer. He realised that he had become an observer of life, whereas the star thrower was living life, **and** making a difference. He also realised that this was what the Christian religion taught – that every single person is important to God. The star thrower had created an epiphany – a manifestation of God.

Epiphanies are not something we think about; they are experiences that wake us up or change us. The feast of the Epiphany tells us that from the very beginning Jesus is someone to be personally experienced, not someone to be mentally agreed upon, proven or argued about. The feast celebrates that anyone from East or West can discover Jesus and know his love.



At Christmas we celebrated the message of the angels... ‘Peace on Earth and Good will to all people’. On this feast of the Epiphany we celebrate the importance and dignity of every person, wherever they come from, whatever their gifts or lack of gifts. If we want to, we can be like the star thrower: we can make a difference by welcoming and accepting others, whoever they are.

*God's favourite*

By seeing each person as special and treating them that way, we are reflecting how God sees us – that we are each God’s favourite. That is how we can make a difference. We never know how people come to discover or know Jesus, but if the astrologers could find him by following a star, anything is possible.

Let us be a star for others so that they can find Jesus through us, and let us be star-throwers, doing what we can to make a difference




## History repeats itself....



“Scientific breakthroughs and technological innovations characterized the post war and post Spanish flu epidemic, earning it the nickname “the Roaring Twenties. The invention of radio, television, automobiles and aeroplanes transformed society. Yet, these advancements often led to misplaced

confidence in materialism, side-lining virtues like temperance and morality. Consumerism thrived, and spiritual values were neglected. It was a time marked by chaos and dangerous ambition, where humanity wrestled with the question of where true authority resides”. (All Saints Anglican Church, Clifton, 2025)

Retail analyst Victor Lebow stated in 1955: "Our enormously productive economy demands that we make consumption our way of life, that we convert the buying and use of goods into rituals, that we seek our spiritual satisfaction, our ego satisfaction, in consumption".



Aldous Huxley critiqued consumerism in works like *Brave New World*, suggesting it leads to a superficial society obsessed with instant gratification and neglecting deeper values like spirituality.

Jesuit priest John F. Kavanaugh, author of *Following Christ in a Consumer Society: The Spirituality of Everyday Life*, wrote, "The more we try to ground our identities in external possessions or triumphs... the less we find underneath".



Cosmologist Brian Swimme claims that children today are more influenced by ads on television than they are by religion. Their spiritual development is replaced by materialism. Before entering first grade and before entering in any way into religious ceremonies, a child will have soaked up 30,000 advertisements”.





